# Practical Information

## Airport Taxis

Metered Taxis are available on the arrivals level at both Domestic and International terminals. Taxi fare is charged according to taxi meter.

## Getting to/from the Convening

Coaches will shuttle between the convening venue and the hotels every morning and return at night.

- Hotels:** Pickup and drop off at the front entrances of La Thanh and the Intercontinental Hotel.
- VNU:** Pickup and drop off at the fountain in front of the Administration Building at VNU.

## Around Town

**By Car:** Download Grab, GoViet, or Be on your smart phone to arrange for car transportation with clear and fixed pricing. Hailing a taxi (or motorcyclist) on the street is possible, too, but prices may rise much higher, especially for foreigners.

**By Electric Car:** Electric cars will take you through the 2 streets of the Old Quarter for just 15,000-30,000VND per person. There are always a few stationed in the fountain in Dong Kinh Nghia Thuc square.

**By Tricycle:** Much more expensive than the electric cars. Ask about the fee and route ahead of time; it may range from 100,000-200,000 VND.

## Getting Connected

### Wifi

Wifi is available at the conference hotels, and at VNU.

### Data & Cellular

You can buy 3G/4G SIM cards at the airport from many networks (Viettel, Vinaphone, Mobiphone, Vietnamobile) or you can buy it from any stores with the sign “BAN SIM” on the way. Each network has many options for domestic, international, and internet data plans. The recommended choice is Viettel, which offers two options:

- Tourist Voice: Calls, messages, 3G/4GViettel data
- Tourist Data: Messages and data only

Do not leave the store without instructions on how to activate the SIM card or with a SIM which is already activated.

## General Tips

---

**Weather:** Average temperatures are around 34 celcius. Carry water, sunscreen, and a sunhat.

**Dress code:** Dress for heat, but also for rain! Wear loose clothing with long sleeves to prevent sunburn. Carry an umbrella. Business casual clothing is suggested during the convening. No suits needed, but note that our museum reception will include media and press.

**Shoes:** We recommend casual dress shoes for the convening, and closed-toe shoes like sneakers for exploring the city; this way, you will be comfortable walking the uneven streets of Hanoi.

**Walking Around Town:** When traveling around town, leave your passport and visa documents at the hotel. Keep your local ID and a printed copy of your passport and documentation with you instead. Keep your belongings in sight to avoid pick pocketing.

**Cash:** 1 million to 1.5 million VND will be enough to allow you to experience the street food of Hanoi and Hanoi’s sights comfortably. There is a branch of Shinhan bank on 14 Le Thai To street (right next to Hoan Kim Lake) if you want to withdraw more cash.

**Your belongings:** Look after them carefully; when you leave the coaches or the classrooms, take everything with you. We are not responsible for items lost or stolen.

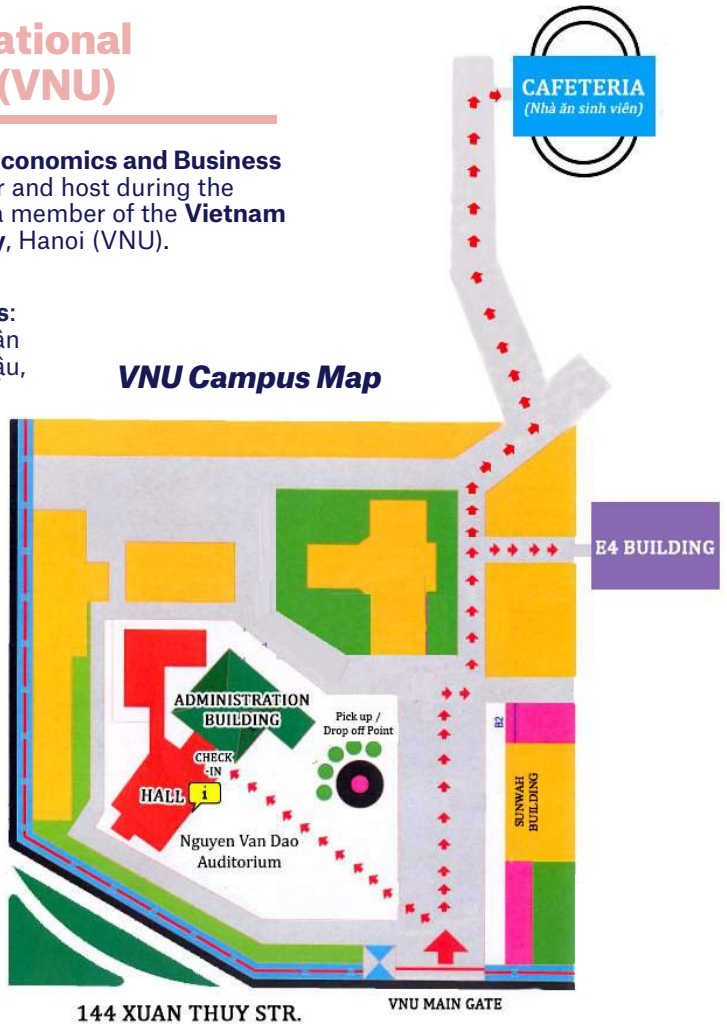

## Exploring Hanoi

If you have time before or after the convening, we hope you'll enjoy Hanoi! The following activities are recommended by our local organizers.



**Imperial Citadel of Thang Long (UNESCO World Heritage Site in Hanoi)** is an intriguing relic of Vietnam's history is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The central flag tower is often used as a symbol of Hanoi. **Opening Hours:** Tuesday-Sunday 08:00- 17:00 **Location:** 9 Hoang Dieu, Dien Bien, Ba Dinh District, Hanoi **Price Range:** VND 30,000





### **Water Puppet Theatre**

The ancient art form of water puppetry has a long association with Hanoi and there are several theatres where guests can enjoy this uniquely Vietnamese take on Asia's puppet tradition. The original – and widely regarded as the best – theatre in town is the Thang Long Puppet Theatre. **Opening Hours:** Daily 15:00, 16:10, 17:20, 18:30 & 20:00 **Address:** 57B, Dinh Tien Hoang Street, Hoan Kiem District, Hanoi. **Price Range:** VND 100,000



### **Ho Chi Minh Museum**

Ho Chi Minh has left an indelible mark on Vietnamese history and he is revered in Hanoi as the country's greatest leader. Nicknamed 'Uncle Ho' by locals, his preserved body is now laid to rest in a glass case in the Ba Dinh area of Hanoi. **Opening Hours:** Tuesday-Thursday 07:30-10:30, Saturday & Sunday 07:30-11:00 **Location:** 8 Hung Vuong, Dien Bien, Ba Dinh, Hanoi



**The Perfume Pagoda** is a dramatic temple complex believed to have been first built in the 15th century. These Buddhist temples were built into a mountain range in a maze of alleyways carved into the rock with rich forests and flowing streams all around.

**Opening Hours:** Daily 06:30-17:00  
**Location:** Huong Son, My Duc, Hanoi



**Hoan Kiem Lake and Ngoc Son** is a wonderful place to take photos, Hoan Kiem Lake (Turtle Lake) is a central feature of Hanoi and is a popular hangout spot throughout the day with locals and tourists. Ngoc Son Temple sits on a small island in the center of the lake and linked by a bridge. **Location:** Hanoi Old Quarter  
**Opening Hours** (for Ngoc Son Temple): Daily 08:00-17:00



**Dong Xuan Market** is the largest of its kind in Hanoi. Housed within a four-story Soviet-style Dong Xuan Market building, this sprawling complex offers an extensive collection of fashion, apparel, and souvenirs at some of the best prices in the city.

**Address:** Dong Xuan Street, Hoan Kiem District, Hanoi



**Hanoi Old Quarter** is a fascinating area of the city where visitors can enjoy many fine examples of colonial architecture packed along narrow streets. Endless packs of scooters, motorbikes, bicycles, and cars weave around traders selling fruit and souvenirs and narrow shop houses sell delicious Vietnamese food for pennies.



**Ba Vi National Park** is a nature reserve of stunning beauty located around two hours (48km) from downtown Hanoi. Famous for its three-peaked mountain that juts steeply up into the sky and is often topped by cloud cover, Ba Vi National Park has dramatic scenery and a diverse range of jungle plants and animals. **Location:** 48 km west of Hanoi

**Jayati Ghosh** is a development economist and Professor of Economics at the Centre for Economic Studies and Planning, School of Social Sciences, at the Jawaharlal Nehru University, in New Delhi, India. Her specialities include globalization, international finance, employment patterns in developing countries, macroeconomic policy, and issues related to gender and development.

**Naomi Klein** is an award-winning journalist and New York Times bestselling author of *No Logo*, *The Shock Doctrine*, *This Changes Everything*, and *No is Not Enough*. She is Senior Correspondent for *The Intercept*, a Puffin Writing Fellow at Type Media Center and is the inaugural Gloria Steinem Chair in Media, Culture and Feminist Studies at Rutgers University.



**Katharina Pistor** is Professor of Comparative Law at Columbia Law School and Director of the Law School's Center on Global Legal Transformation. Her research and teaching spans corporate law, corporate governance, money and finance, property rights, comparative law and law and development. She has published widely in legal and interdisciplinary journals and is the author and co-author of several books.

**Danny Quah** is Li Ka Shing Professor in Economics at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore. Quah's work includes contributions to the fields of economic growth, development economics, monetary economics, macroeconometrics, and the weightless economy.



**Andrew Sheng** is a distinguished fellow at Fung Global Institute, chief adviser to the China Banking Regulatory Commission, and a board member of Khazanah Nasional Berhad, the sovereign wealth fund of Malaysia. He also serves as an adviser to the UN Environment Program Inquiry into the Design of a Sustainable Financial System.

# YSI Working Groups

**The following YSI Working Groups are represented at this convening:**

**Africa** - The Africa Working Group identifies key economic issues for Africa and the continent's economic development. How do we overcome colonial legacies, weak institutions, high inequality, and bring the continent into the future?

**Cooperatives** - The Cooperatives Working Group aims to bring together researchers interested in cooperatives from a wide range of disciplinary and regional backgrounds. We want to get scholars interested in cooperatives and economic cooperation talking to one another, sharing our research, and developing new questions and ideas to better understand economic cooperation.

**Complexity Economics** - Economies and societies are complex and evolving systems. Complexity Economics explores the dynamics, networks, interactions, and heterogeneity within the ever evolving system.

**East Asia** - The YSI East Asia working group discusses issues regarding economic development in East Asia region including, but not limited to, the Asian capitalism, institutions, policies, financial markets and sustainability. We aim to understand different trajectories of economic growth in the continent, and welcome an interdisciplinary approach.

**Economic Development** - The Economic Development Working Group discusses developmental challenges by studying a range of theoretical and methodological approaches, including Institutional Economics, Post-Keynesian Economics, Austrian Economics, Classical Economics, Marxian Economics, Structuralist Economics, and New-Keynesian Economics.

**Economic History** - Economic history is a vital tool for understanding economics today, particularly in the aftermath of the Great Recession. The Economic History Working Group studies institutional, narrative, theoretical, and empirical research in macroeconomics, financial, and business history. It bridges the intellectual gap between finance and macroeconomics. Topics of particular interest are the rise of financial globalization, new forms of banking intermediation, and payment systems and their implication for the stability of the financial system.

**Economics of Innovation** - The Innovation Working Group views innovation as being central to the process of economic development and growth. They aim to study how economic actors, policies, technology and market conditions interact and evolve over time.

**Finance, Law and Economics** - Finance, law, and economics are inherently interrelated disciplines. The Finance, Law and Economics Working Group brings economists, lawyers and practitioners together in order to understand issues of financial stability, financial market reform and the future of the banking and payments systems.

**Financial Stability** - The Financial Stability Working Group studies novel approaches to monetary economics and bridges the intellectual gap between finance and macroeconomics.

Topics of particular interest are the rise of financial globalization, new forms of banking intermediation, and payment systems and their implication for the stability of the financial system.

**Gender and Economics** - Studying the role of gender within economic theory is a part of a general project to rethink economics in a different way, either as a revised version of conventional economics, or as a deep critique to the way economics is and has been framed.

**History of Economic Thought** - The History of Economic Thought Working Group is devoted to disinterring the roots of contemporary economic orthodoxy, exhuming time-honored rival approaches, and imagining possible futures.

**Inequality** - The Inequality Working Group explores the philosophical and technical aspects of the link between inequality and economics: What are economists talking about when they talk about inequality? And why is inequality even relevant to economics?

**Keynesian Economics** - A Keynesian approach to economics supposes that output and employment growth of capitalist economies are constrained by aggregate demand. The Keynesian Working Group provides insightful discussions on how the Keynesian framework can help us to deal with the current depressed state of most economies.

**South Asia** - The South Asia working group provides a platform for young scholars that are interested in the economic questions of the South Asian region. Although the region is abundant in natural and human resources, it faces inequality, agricultural distress, political uncertainty and financial instability, among other things.

**States and Markets** - The States and Markets Working Group reconsiders the relationship between states and markets, including the idea that the state 'intervenes' in the economy, the concept of 'the state' and 'the economy' as two separate spheres, as well as additional categories such as 'public' and 'private'

**Sustainability** - The Sustainability Working Group explores how new economic thinking can contribute to the issues of environmental challenges, such as climate change, pollution, and the management and distribution of finite resources.

**Urban and Regional Economics** - The Urban and Regional Economics Working Group explores the role of geographical space on economics and development, as well as the role of cities and the emerging importance of the political economy of urbanization.

### **Other YSI Working Groups**
